Everyone in LAHS feels a deep commitment to the community as a whole as well as the preservation of the historical heritage of Coastal Georgia. The publication of the McIntosh County Cemetery book went into its second printing and has proven to be an invaluable resource in genealogical research. We still have a few copies left in addition to other books listed on the enclosed list of LAHS Historical Publications.

The society installed a marker (the 2nd within 18 months) on the grounds of the Darien City Hall that describes the Burning of Darien in 1863. We anticipate installing other historical markers in the coming year

LAHS has become committed to Habitat for Humanity a worthy community building cause. Many members gave their time and energy to the painting of the latest house. We will be doing this again in the coming year

LAHS continues the commitment to scholarship recipient, Jason M. Frawley. Jason continues his graduate history studies at Georgia Southern University.

LAHS remains dedicated to the continued success of Fort King George through financial support as well as joint historical program participation. As part of this year's "Scottish Heritage Days" celebration, the March program featured Dr. Anthony W. Parker from the University of Dundee in Scotland. Dr. Parker discussed his book, "Scottish Highlanders in Colonial Georgia. the recruitment, emigration, and settlement at Darien."

As a part of our regular agenda, our annual summer picnic was on the grounds of Fort King George. We had exclusive use of the new Barracks facility for the picnic. The annual Christmas holiday party was celebrated at Belvedere Island Plantation.

Field trips this past year included a dinner tour of historic Fort Jackson in Savannah and an outing to Cumberland Island to tour the historic ruins of Dungeness, the Carnegie family home at the southern end of the island. The upcoming trip this fall will be a Ghost Tour of Laurel Grove Cemetery in Savannah. This will occur on the evening of November 2nd.

This past year William G. Haynes, Jr., Director Emeritus, one of the founder of LAHS, passed away Malcolm Bell, a Lifetime Member and longtime supporter of LAHS, passed away. Lilian Schaitberger, one of the original members of the Board of Directors, is still very active in the society and served on the April hospitality committee. Buddy Sullivan, our past president and local Coastal Georgia historian, was elected to the position of Director Emeritus of LAHS.

It is through the spirit of volunteers that LAHS is able to achieve our dual mission of preserving our historical heritage as well as active community involvement. The officers and Board of Directors want to personally thank the Committee Chairman and all the members of their committees for making the past year a successful one.

RICE HOPE

Famous Rice and Indigo Piantation of Colonial and Revolutionary times. Rice Hope was the home of George McIntosh, son of John McIntosh Mor of Darien, and brother of General Lachian McIntosh. George McIntosh was Official Surveyor for St. Andrew's Parish, Member of the Commons House of Assembly, Member of the First Provincial Congress of Georgia, Member of the Council of Safety During the Revolution, the home of George McIntosh at Rice Hope was burned and his slaves and stock run off by the British.

JOHN HOUSTOUN MeINTOSH

John Houstoun McIntosh, son of George McIntosh, was born at Rice Hope, May 1, 1773

When a young man, he settled in East Florida and became a leader of the U.S. citizens living there. He was appointed "Governor or Director of the Republic of Florida" in 1812. After a stormy career in Florida, he returned to Georgia, and in 1818 served in the Seminole War as General in the Militia.

In 1825, he began intensive cultivation of sugar cane on his plantation in Camden County, and there installed the first horizontal sugar mill ever worked by cuttle power.

SAPELO ISLAND National Estuarine Research Reserve

Supply Island enables visitors to see virtually every facet of a barrier islands's natural community, from the diversified withfule of the forested uplands, to the vast expanses of salt marsh and the complex beach and dunes systems.
