The current status and health of coastal Georgia's once-thriving oyster fishery will be the subject of a lecture on May 18th by Dominic Guadagnoli, Shellfish Program Manager for the Coastal Resources Division of the Georgia Department of Natural Resources. In the late 1800s and early 1900s Georgia had one of the most productive oyster industries in the United States because of the extensive beds along the coast between the barrier islands and the mainland. Over-harvesting of oysters and the failure to adequately re-seed contributed to a decline in the industry. Guadagnoli will discuss ongoing projects by Georgia DNR to restore Georgia's oyster beds with multi-purpose benefits, including aiding the coastal economy, providing additional fish habitat, tidal creek and river bank stabilization, and improved water quality. Historical analysis of oyster harvesting trends, regular water quality monitoring initiatives, and the provision of commercial harvesting leases in designated oyster Growing Areas are ongoing programs that will contribute toward a revitalization of coastal harvests.

LAHS President and McIntosh County Historian Buddy Sullivan will present a lecture, "North McIntosh County: Land Use and Landscape," a history of human activity in the section of the county between the South Newport and Sapelo Rivers. The June 15th slide talk will focus on Harris Neck, Sutherland's Bluff, Pine Harbor, Fairhope, South Newport and Eulonia, with emphasis on antebellum plantation development, the growth of postbellum freedmen communities at Harris Neck and 20th century developments. North McIntosh County's history has always held a fascination for Sullivan and it comprises a large section of his county history, *Early Days on the Georgia Tidewater*. The evolution of land use through agriculture, cattle ranges and naval stores production in the 1800s and early 1900s on the tracts along the South Newport River from Harris Neck to South Newport has played an integral part of the history of McIntosh County. The same may be said of the areas of Shellman Bluff, Pine Harbor, Fairhope and White Chimney. The World War Two Harris Neck airfield will also be discussed in the lecture.

In Their Own Words:

*From GeorgiaInfo, an on-line almanac about the state of Georgia
(To coincide with LAHS meeting dates)*

May 18, 1737: The few years John Wesley spent in Georgia were not particularly happy ones for him, as he viewed his ministry in Georgia as a failure. Evidence of this can be found in the following note from his journal: "I discovered the first Convert to Deism that (I believe) has been made here. He was one that for some time had been zealously and exemplarily religious. But indulging himself in harmless Company, he first made shipwreck of his Zeal, and then of his Faith. I have since found several others that have been attack'd. They have as yet maintain'd their Ground. But I doubt the Devil's Apostles are too industrious to let them long halt between two Opinions." *Our First Visit in America: Early Reports from the Colony of Georgia, 1732-1740.*

June 15, 1865: On this day, Eliza Frances Andrews put away her despair over the loss of the Civil War and had some fun: "This has been a day of jokes - as crazy almost as if it were the first of April.... After we had each told everything we could think of to raise a laugh against the other, he put on a serious face, and began to hint, in a very mysterious way, that he thought this house was a dangerous place. 'There are ghosts in it,' he said, and then, to our utter amazement, went on to tell, as if he were relating a genuine ghost story, about Capt. Goldthwaite's encounter with Cousin Liza the other morning, as he was coming out of his room to take the early train. He evidently didn't know, when he started, who the real ghost was ... and he would find out by telling the story at the dinner table....We thought this would be a good joke, and it turned out even better than we expected, when Cousin Liza walked right into the trap....Then, when she had betrayed herself as completely as she could, the captain gravely told his ghost story. But instead of laughing with the rest of us, she got on her high horse and gave him a piece of her mind that silenced him for that time as a story-teller. Everybody wanted to laugh, and everybody was afraid to speak, so we all looked down at our plates and ate as hard as we could, in dead silence. I expected every minute to hear somebody break out in a tell-tale snicker, but we held in till dinner was over... *The War-Time Journal of a Georgia Girl, 1864-1865.*

July 20, 1774: Two years before the Declaration of Independence, Georgians were expressing their concern with being taxed by Great Britain without their consent, as evidenced by the following notice that appeared in the *Georgia Gazette*: "The critical situation to which the British Colonies in America are likely to be reduced, from the arbitrary and alarming imposition of the late acts of the British Parliament respecting the town of Boston, as well as the acts that at present exist, tending to the raising of a perpetual revenue without the consent of the people or their representatives, is considered an object extremely important at this juncture, and particularly calculated to deprive the American subjects of their constitutional rights and liberties, as a part of the British Empire. It is therefore requested that all persons within the limits of this Province do attend at Savannah, on Wednesday, the 27th of July, in order that the said matters may be taken into consideration, and such other constitutional measures pursued as may appear most eligible. Signed, Noble W. Jones, Archibald Bulloch, John Houstoun, John Walton. 14th July, 1774."
