Susan grew up in the South Dakota–Minnesota region and later completed her master's degree in southwestern Ohio. Her career has taken her across the United States, ultimately landing her on a Georgia barrier island in 2002, where she spent nearly a decade immersed




in coastal conservation. There, one of the many projects focused on shorebird research through the American Oystercatcher Program in partnership with the Georgia Department of Natural Resources, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and private coastal landowners.

Today, Susan serves as an advocate for both natural resources and the communities that depend on them at One Hundred Miles (OHM), a coastal conservation nonprofit. While her work is more action-based now, her roots in the birding world remain strong. OHM's mission—protecting Georgia's coast through education, advocacy, and community engagement—reflects her belief that healthy ecosystems and healthy communities are deeply interconnected.

Susan's passion for understanding the land's past and the people who have shaped it led her to join the LAHS group. She continues to learn from local historians and generational connections, always with an eye toward what we leave for those who come next. Susan is on our Board as our new Secretary. 


Book of Interest


Noteworthy

ST. SIMONS LAND TRUST

Concerned with increased high-density development that was negatively impacting St. Simons, more than twenty years ago the Land Trust's founders built an organization that could partner with residents and visitors to protect the unique qualities of this barrier island. To fulfill its Mission, achievable and visionary goals were created to strategically acquire and conserve properties that were most vulnerable to destruction of environmental values and cultural, historic features.

The Mission included a far-sighted approach that ensured long-lasting, positive impact on those who currently, and for generations to come, live on and visit the island. This included providing green spaces, trails, pocket parks, and vistas as well as protecting rare ecosystems, maritime forests, shorelines, streams, and large tracts of undeveloped land. This important Mission has inspired a culture of conservation on St. Simons Island.

The St. Simons Land Trust has preserved and protected 35 island properties since it was founded in 2000, totaling nearly 1,400 acres or roughly 14% of the island. Join us for *Family Day!*:Sat., Oct. 11, 9:30am-12:30pm at Cannons Point Preserve. Hike or bike the Preserve, partake in scavenger hunts, experience family-friendly guided hikes and wildlife presentations, take photos in the Dahlia Photo Booth, and enjoy educational booths from other local Land Trust partners.
