Hello, LAHS members!

The Society has had a good quarter this Spring, with three memorable speakers, an exciting field trip, and ten new memberships. Let's all welcome these new members when they join us at our regular monthly meetings.

Twenty-six members enjoyed a field trip last month to historic St. Marys, where they took "Molly's Tours", visiting the old town's historic buildings such as the First Presbyterian Church, one of the oldest church buildings in Georgia, and the historic Riverview Hotel where the Rockefeller's and Carnegie's stayed. They toured hangouts of smugglers, the shelter for a fleeing Aaron Burr, and a home base for Revolutionary War traitors. Members were entertained and informed in February by DNR Specialist, and LAHS Board member, Paul Medders, who spoke eloquently of the ecology of salt marshes. In March, the program was brought to us by Matthew Rowe of GDNR, who talked about freshwater mussels and the Altamaha river basin. April brought us a special treat when Board member, Eric Teal, told us of life growing up in the forests and on the beaches of Sapelo Island. He told us the inspiring story of his mother and father's groundbreaking scientific work on Sapelo, and later at Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution in Massachusetts.

Please note in May, at our regular meeting, we will hold the LAHS annual business meeting, where new Board members will be voted on, in addition to our usual program speaker. Also, this meeting will be my last as president of the Society, although I will remain on the Board as Treasurer. I have thoroughly enjoyed my two years, leading the Board through a rebirth of sorts. Some of the goals we set have been achieved, but many remain uncompleted. I believe the improvements that the Board has achieved have significantly strengthened the organization's infrastructure for the coming decades.

October: One Hundred Miles



Dyson Flanders, a Past President of the Coastal Georgia Historical Society, and I were married for 50 years and lived on St. Simons Island for 33 years. We believed in travel and toured Europe with our two children when they were young. I have 4 grandchildren and 8 great-grands. Dyson and I taught for many years with Elderhostel =CDF, Flora and Fauna of the Golden Isles and LYF= History. We were the hosts of many group tours of Sapelo. Noteworthy

Why Were Barns Painted Red?

The practice of painting barns red started in the late 18th century with New England farmers applying a protective varnish to barn surfaces to protect the wood from weathering prematurely. The barns were painted with linseed oil, which is an orange-colored oil derived from the seeds of the flax plant. To this oil, they would add a variety of things, most often milk and lime, but also ferrous oxide, or rust. Rust was plentiful on farms and because it killed fungi and mosses that might grow on barns, it was very effective as a sealant. It turned the mixture red in color. Red paint is one of the cheapest colors available to purchase. Eventually, as red paint became available, many people continued the color tradition.
